Phases of the Robin Chorus Moon And the Goose Nesting Moon

April 1: The Moon is full.
April 10: The Moon enters its final quarter.
April 17: The Goose Nesting Moon is new.
April 24: The moon enters its second quarter.
May 1: The Moon is full.

The Week Ahead

Rain is the rule for April's second quarter. After the third major high-pressure system passes through, however, a brief mid-April dry spell typically occurs on the 11th and 12th, chances of precipitation falling to 25 percent.

The 11th is also the brightest day in the first half of April, bringing an 80 percent chance of sun, the best chances since the 7th of March.

As for temperatures, chances of highs below 50 degrees fall to less than ten percent on the 11th where they remain until they drop to five percent on April 22nd.

Milder highs above 60s occur better than half the time on all the days of this quarter except on the 10th, when cooler conditions typically prevail.

Frost strikes an average of 30 percent of the nights.

April 10: Decorative Pears, Ashes, Sugar Maples
April 11: Crab Apples, Bleeding Heart, Blue Cohosh
April 12: Cherries, Peaches

In the Field and Garden

The next two weeks are favored for completing the seeding of garden crops. Early sweet corn and peas should be put in as soon as possible.

Only seven weeks before the most tender plants can be placed outdoors.

Three more weeks of relatively mosquito-free gardening remain.

Grass is usually long enough to cut by today across the nation's midsection. Strawberries flower when grass is long, and young ground-hogs come out to feed on the greens.

Dig in new strawberry, raspberry, and blackberry plants. Set out head lettuce. Check roses for disease and insects as new leaves emerge. Mounds begin to show on your lawn as moles wake up and hunt grubs and worms.

April Frostwatch

Between April 1 and June 1, up to dozen frosts occur at lower elevations along the 40th Parallel during a typical year.

April 1:	95%
April 5:	90%
April 10:	80%
April 15:	70%
April 20:	50%
April 25:	40%
April 30:	30%

Countdown to Summer

- One week until lilacs bloom in your dooryards
- Two weeks until all the honeysuckles flower

Journal

Keeping a notebook of what happens every day in the small world around me, I often think about the cyclical quality of events in nature.

The repeating quality of the sky and the landscape, is something similar to what sociologist Charles Taylor describes as "Higher Time" (as opposed to linear, "Secular Time") in his study of the rise of humanism, *A Secular Age*.

In *Secular Time*, says Taylor, "one thing happens after another, and when something is past, it's past."

Higher Time, on the other hand dramatizes cycles like those represented in the Christian liturgical calendar or in the repeating nature of the year.

And even though the modern world seems to do business completely in *Secular Time*, the alternate viewpoint persists and may even be dominant inside memory.

Memory Time is always Higher Time.

Not only does memory retain a whole impression of experience, but it also blends, erases, and re-sequences pieces of the past, allowing the feasts of birth and death, love and disappointment to return, mellow or fester, winnowed to their core.

So too with observation of the natural year, the

repetition of the seasons within the mind mixes and combines the years, unifies them, reevaluates them, distortions showing the selective power of emotion and insight over linear statistics.

To withdraw from *Secular Time* is to come home to a centered self where experiences are sifted and unified and made whole to return again.

Like a book of days, the mind recollects choices and destinies, showing and combining in the radii of its vortex the higher shadows and auras of repeating suns.

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Jesus Is King! Words of Inspiration By Pastor Ryan Harker

We just celebrated Easter, Resurrection Sunday. Resurrection Sunday isn't just about Jesus' resurrection, though. It points us forward, to what comes next: Jesus' Ascension, His bodily return to the heavenly throne room. One thing that His Ascension means that Jesus is King. Right now, as I write this, He is sitting on His heavenly throne. That means a great deal for the Christian life. Jesus is the Son of God who took on flesh at Christmastime. Before the incarnation, the Son of God was on His throne. But when he became a human being, He became one of us so that He could redeem us. So then, when He returned to His throne after the resurrection, it was the human Jesus returned to His throne. That's a big deal, because now, the One who sits on the throne as King of the Universe is also our High Priest who can sympathize with us (Hebrews 4:14-16). He intercedes for us (Romans 8:34). He ministers to us (Hebrews 8), because He has experienced the full range of human temptations and sufferings (Hebrews 4:15). Not only that, but Jesus is also

the Messiah that the Old Testament prophets wrote about. He's the suffering servant that Isaiah wrote about (Isaiah 42, 49, 50, 52-53). The only way that prophecy could come true is for God Himself to take on flesh, conquer sin and death, and then return to His throne. He's the Son of God who is also the Son of David, the Son of Man. What this means is that when we make Jesus the King of our lives, we are falling in line with the way that creation was always meant to be: in subjection to God's kingship. When our hearts, our minds, our very lives are lived in subjection to our King, then they begin to

be transformed by His work in us through the Holy Spirit. That's the other piece in this. When King Jesus returned to His throne, He made it possible for us to receive the Holy Spirit. And so, when He becomes King of our lives, that's when the Holy Spirit takes up residence in our very selves and gets to work making us increasingly like Christ. With time, everything about our lives changes. Jesus is set on conquering everything in His kingdom that is opposed to His will. That includes within each of our hearts, minds, and wills. So, when we recognize Jesus as King, we are blessedly opening our-

selves up to His sanctifying work in us. But most of us don't make Jesus King of every part of our lives all at once. In my experience, most of us keep parts of ourselves back from King Jesus. Do you do that? Whatever that part (or parts) may be, we so often try to maintain our own sovereignty over certain parts of our lives while inviting Jesus to take over kingship of other parts. In other words, we try to have it both ways. We try to have Jesus as King and ourselves as kings, and we end up not being that different than the Israelites in the desert who tried to worship the golden calf and the LORD. True freedom, though, comes in total submission to King Jesus. That's one of the paradoxes of the Christian faith: we won't know what it's like to be truly free until we are completely subjected to our King. So here is a suggestion for your prayer time over the coming weeks: pray that God would reveal to you the areas where you've tried to hold on to control in your life rather than giving Him control. Pray that you will have the courage to release control to Jesus, to give yourself to His sovereignty. FN

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Easter is More Than Rabbits and Eggs

Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow

The Lenten season is here and Easter is near.

The time period between Maundy Thursday and Resurrection Sunday is something I've thought about often... the heart felt emotional condition of Jesus to all that was happening to Him.

A little over fifty years ago, I wrote a poem about this.

It centered around the belief that I was the one who caused the crucifixion of Jesus – with the sins I had committed.

Considering this I tried to meditate on what Jesus experienced at each stage of events during that four day/night period.

I realize this was a fruitless attempt but I wanted to use my deepest imagination.

I tried to imagine Jesus, walking slowly up the Mount of Olives to the Garden of Gethsemane with Peter, John and James.

Peter, at his side and John and James immediately behind.

I invite you to join me now as I go on an imaginative journey through those four days.

1) I visualize Jesus telling them to wait while he goes over to pray.

2) I try to feel the pain and agony Jesus felt as he walked on to a spot where he fell, prostrate, asking His Father to remove this task if possible and agreeing if it was the Father's will.

Clearly, he saw what was to come in the days ahead and how difficult it would be.

It brings tears to my eyes thinking about it.

3) Imagine the disappointment Jesus had when He returned and found the disciples sleeping.

Of course, he had no idea what Jesus must do.

4) The agony of Him praying again as He kneels in the garden.

If it is not possible for this cup to be taken away, I will drink it – your will be done.

Oh, how much the heart of Jesus is hurting.

5) I try to imagine the

disappointment Jesus felt as Judas kissed His cheek, even though He knew it was going to occur and mentioned it at the Last Supper.

6) What was he feeling as he stood before Caiaphas and the Sanhedrin who looked for a reason to put Him to death.

The heartfelt agony must have been tremendous.

How Jesus must have felt as the High Priest tore His clothes and accused Him of blasphemy.

Remember, Jesus is going through all of this for you and me.

We should be experiencing this ourselves.

Then they spit on His face, struck Him with their fist, slapped Him and mocking Him through it all.

I can't help it, tears come to my eyes.

Jesus knew that one of His closest friends would deny Him, not just once but three times...how sad.

What was He feeling when the crowd voted to release Barabbas instead of Him, voting for sin over righteousness.

There are times I try to form a mental picture of Him standing in the courtyard before Pilate.

The agony that was in His heart as the crowd was chanting, "crucify him".

In my mind, I can see the lacerations on His body where they whipped Him.

I see the bruises where they beat and kicked Him.

I see the blood that has congealed around His open wounds.

My heart aches for Him because I know who He is doing this for.

I try to feel the pain in my heart as they stripped Him of His clothes, put on a scarlet robe and a crown of sharp thorns.

I see the blood as it runs down His forehead, I'm in heartfelt pain.

They continued to mock Him, strike Him on the head with a staff, and spit on Him.

Then they led Him away to be crucified.

Hail, King of the Jews, they shouted.

They had him bear a large wooden cross as they made their way to Golgotha.

I see Jesus shoulder on his shoulders, dragging it along with difficulty up an inclined street of cobblestone.

Mentally, I watch each time He fell under the unbearable weight of the cross and I see the soldiers whip Him each time.

My heart breaks.

He is exhausted and it's obvious He will not make it all the way, therefore someone is selected to carry it for Him, but He still goes on in His weakened condition.

All the while the street is lined with people who

threw insults at Him as He passed by.

I see a large crowd on Golgotha...mostly antagonists along with a few friends of Jesus and Mary, the mother of Jesus weeping profusely.

The large wooden cross is laying flat on the ground.

They have removed the robe previously placed on Him and He is wearing only a loin cloth, his back, chest, and legs bare.

They throw Jesus against the rugged, hewn cross that had splinters and jagged wood from the tool that used to hewn the wood.

As Jesus body met the wood of the cross the splinters pricked his skin and the force of being thrown down on the cross created additional bleeding.

Jesus' mouth was so dry, but he could not drink the wine mixed with gall that they offered Him.

As He lay on the cross, on the ground, a soldier took a spike and drove it through His hand as He winced in pain, then did the same to His other hand.

A soldier held both feet in place as another spike was driven through them... I'm certain Jesus must have cried out in pain.

Mockingly, they placed on the cross above his head, a sign that read, "Jesus, King of the Jews".

As they raised the cross

to be set in the ground, I'm sure the weight of His body must have been extremely painful as it pulled at the site of the spikes.

Many in the crowd continued to mock and laugh at Him telling Him if He is the Son of God come down from the cross and save yourself.

I must believe that a great deal of His mental anguish came from the crowd's rejection of Him while His suffering came from the physical pain inflicted on Him.

I try to imagine the heaviness felt in the hearts of those that loved him as the darkness settled over the land between noon and three.

I picture in my mind, how at the three o'clock hour He cried out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me"?

I feel remorse for my sins and I am sorrowful.

Jesus is dead – It is my fault and I am so sorry.

The women who cared for Jesus watched from a distance.

Oh, how heavy their hearts must have been.

I formed a mental picture as Joseph of Arimathea wrapped Jesus body and placed it in a tomb.

I could see the large stone placed over the entrance.

Evening came, Jesus was dead and lying in the tomb and many people thought everything was over...even His followers.

I saw the women that cared for Jesus, sitting opposite of the tomb – watching, waiting and wondering.

The chief Priest and Pharisees, remembering Jesus words that on the third day He would arise, asked Pilate to place a guard at the tomb.

I can see the guards standing at the entrance.

I watch as a seal is placed on the tomb entrance.

Saturday was the Sabbath and no doubt a lonely time for Jesus' followers.

Sunday was the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene and Mary were going

There was only one thing I had in mind as I sprinted for those big glass doors — get me to Daniel's side!

Hours later I was admitted into his room.

It was Daniel, but oh! "I'm here, Daniel, it's me."

I held his hand and watched intently for the slightest sign that he knew I was there.

I was thrilled when I could tell he heard.

An hour later I was ushered out of his room, where I crumbled in the waiting room — another surgery to find where the bleeding was coming from, little hope of survival.

Food was hardly an option; my body screamed for water, so I kept guzzling it.

After a bit we shuffled downstairs, where I met our dear children.

When they showered me with questions about Daddy,

Who took a stick and beat Him,

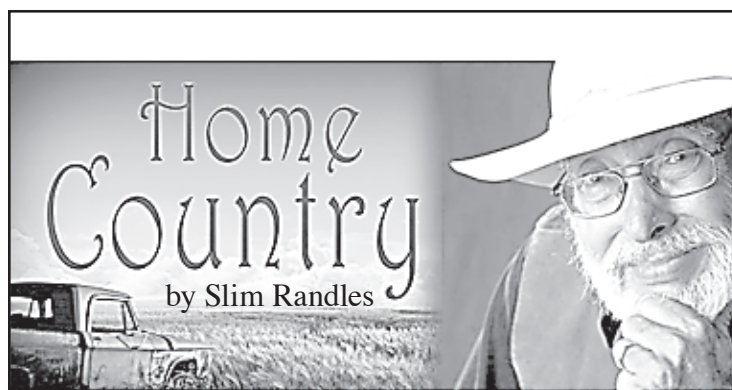
That He might feel the pain,

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New Projects

Thanks to a state grant, several construction projects were launched over the winter.

- 1) The interior of the boys' blockhouse restroom was renovated.
- 2) Rustic cabins received a spruce up.
- 3) A new nature center is being constructed.

All of these improvements will be ready at different points in the 2026 season.

Projects Over the Years

There have been several projects completed in the 80-year history of 4-H Camp Palmer.

In 1947, the Dining Hall was built out of a split log construction because that was about the only type of lumber they could secure

due to a lumber shortage caused by World War II.

This is the original building of the Camp, and it is still used today.

In 1950, a large recreational hall was added that included two small modern restrooms which were for staff only.

Unfortunately, the campers still needed a bucket and wash basin to wash their

hands and faces.

Twelve permanent cabins were added in 1953 and 1954.

They were complete with army cots and a shelf on the outside to hold each camper's wash basins.

In 1957, a new swimming pool was completed and on Memorial Day, the

Fayette Fire Department, along with the help of others, filled the pool. In 1962, some much needed flush toilets and warm water showers were installed, however afterwards some people still felt campers were getting soft and pampered.

Over the years, other program buildings were added, such as the craft building and nature center in 1959. Aside from facility additions, in 1990, a special "Challenge by Choice" program area was added that included a high ropes and a team building course. In 2018, the high ropes course was moved from the trees and onto telephone

poles. Both youth and adults utilize the high and low ropes challenges as a useful training tool.

In 1990, a wetland area was constructed on the camp to encourage wildlife, to provide a great place for nature study groups. This along with grasslands and woodlands provides many opportunities for campers to study and observe wildlife.

In 2001, the Woodland Lodge was constructed. This space is a year-round lodge that is snuggled in Camp Palmer but is easily accessed from the main parking lot.

Rob's Cabin, another year-round building with restrooms inside, was built in 2012.

The swimming pool was renovated in 2015, and a new water treatment system was implemented in 2020.

A Place for Everyone

4-H Camp Palmer is proud to be a place where friends meet and goals are set.

All of these projects help contribute to the experiences of thousands of people each year.

Everyone has a special spot at camp, such as:

- The nature center where you get to hold a turtle for the first time.
- The zip line where you take a leap of faith and believe in yourself.
- Out at the black walnut tree where you connect with nature.
- On a cabin porch where you connect with your new best friend.
